Connecticut Audubon Society Center at Fairfield
2325 Burr Street, Fairfield, CT 06824, 203-259-6305. CAS Center at Fairfield adjoins the 155-acre Roy and Margot Larsen Sanctuary and provides visitors a complete environmental experience: 7 miles of walking trails, including a 1-mile special-use nature trail for wheelchair users, and live "Birds of Prey" Compound. The Center has classrooms, a library, retail Nature Store, exhibit areas, Butterfly Atrium, live education animals, and offers year-round programs for children, families and adults.

Established in 1916 by our founder, pioneering conservationist Mabel Osgood Wright, and designated a National Historic Landmark in 1993, CAS Birdcraft Museum's 6-acre Sanctuary is the country's oldest private songbird sanctuary. The Center has a small natural history museum, observatory, boardwalk, handicap-accessible walking trails, teaching bridge and pavilion, classroom space and retail Nature Store, and offers year-round programs for children, families and adults. CAS volunteers have operated a bird-banding station here since 1979.

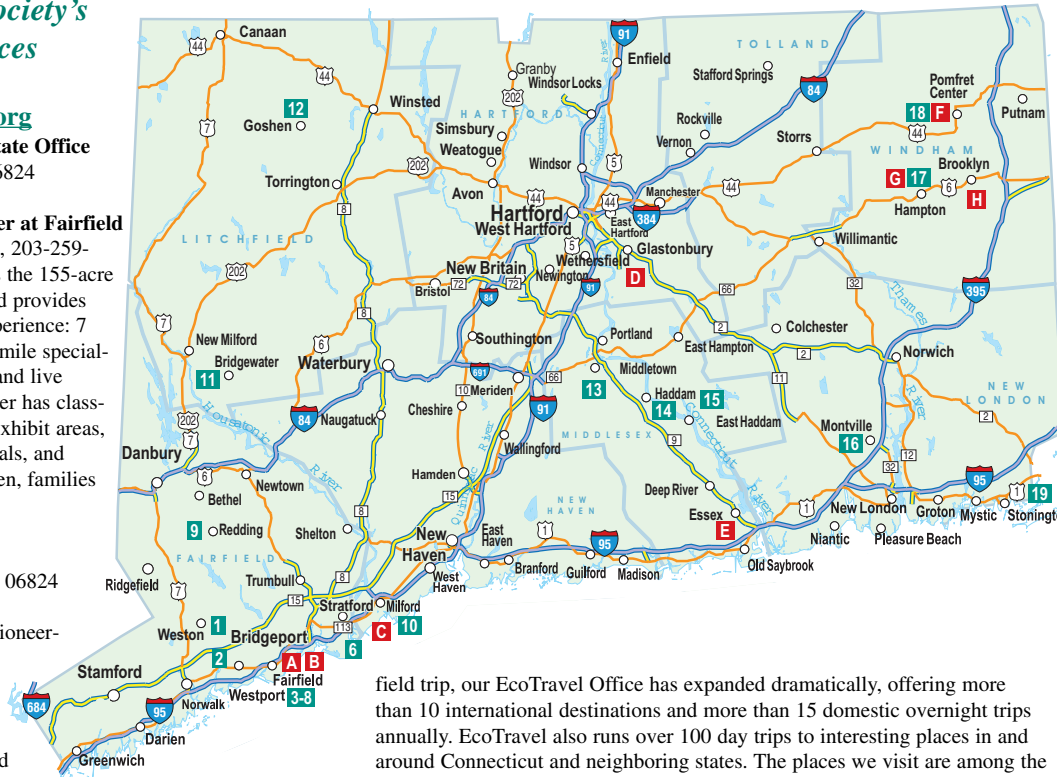
C Connecticut Audubon Society Coastal Center at Milford Point

One of the "Top 10" coastal birding sites in the East, CAS Coastal Center provides unique, hands-on environmental education and outdoor adventures for children, families and adults. Located on an 8.4-acre Wildlife Refuge and Bird Sanctuary, and adjacent to the 840-acre Wheeler Salt Marsh, Coastal Center provides unique, easy access to Long Island Sound's many habitats: tidal salt marshes, barrier beaches, tide pools and coastal dunes. Boardwalks, observation platforms, interpretive signage and a 70-foot observation tower offer panoramic views including our Osprey Nesting Platform (with 24/7 nest coverage via CT's first Osprey Web Cam, at www.ctaudubon.org). The Center contains classroom space, hands-on exhibits, live animals, a salt marsh lab, and retail Nature Store.

D Connecticut Audubon Society Center at Glastonbury

Located near the Connecticut River, the state's major waterway, CAS Center at Glastonbury is adjacent to the 48-acre Town-owned Earle Park, with its forest trails and scenic vistas of Tom's Pond, meadows, and bluffs overlooking the Holland Brook River. The Center's 2,000-square-foot facility offers a full range of environmental programs and full calendar of events for people of all ages, including classes, workshops, lectures and special events. The Discovery Room has wildlife mounts, live small animals and hands-on exhibits.

Since the 1950s, when Connecticut Audubon Society first offered organized



field trip, our EcoTravel Office has expanded dramatically, offering more than 10 international destinations and more than 15 domestic overnight trips annually. EcoTravel also runs over 100 day trips to interesting places in and around Connecticut and neighboring states. The places we visit are among the most environmentally significant and interesting habitats in the world and our tour leaders are knowledgeable, experienced and enthusiastic. EcoTravel also offers many family-oriented trips. Since 2000, EcoTravel has also served as home base for Connecticut Audubon Society's Annual Eagle Festival™, held each February over President's Day Weekend at the Connecticut River Museum in Essex.

CAS Center at Pomfret, surrounded by the rural beauty of CT's northeastern "Quiet Corner," serves as the gateway to the adjoining 700-acre Connecticut Audubon Society Bafflin Sanctuary with its vast rolling meadows, forests, streams and fertile grassland habitats. Our newest community-based Nature Center offers environmental education programs, bird walks, offices and meeting rooms, after-school and weekend programs, day and evening hikes, seasonal lectures and workshops, and changing natural history exhibits.

The 168-acre Trail Wood Sanctuary is the former home of Pulitzer Prize-winning nature author Edwin Way Teale. The woodlands, fields, wetlands and pond habitats abound with wildlife. Trail Wood offers well-developed trails and a small natural history museum with Teale memorabilia, guided nature walks, workshops and seasonal environmental activities.
