The **Galapagos Archipelago** is a unique World Heritage Site, located 600 miles off the coast of Ecuador. Ever since Charles Darwin's famous voyage of the *Beagle*, the islands have provided a wealth of information and inspiration for people throughout the world as the birthplace of evolution.

Join us on a journey to the Galapagos Islands, a remote archipelago where life goes on much as it has for millions of years. Here the animals have no fear of humans, and you can be at one with nature as nowhere else on Earth. Known as a "living laboratory of natural history," a visit here led Darwin to develop his theory of natural selection. Don't miss out on this tremendous learning experience in the "Enchanted Islands."

Day One (Thursday, April 23)

ARRIVING FLIGHTS in QUITO

Overnight: Wyndham Quito Airport Hotel.

Day Two (Friday, April 24)

AM: FLIGHT TO GALAPAGOS

Today, you'll fly from the mainland to the Galapagos Islands. Once in Santa Cruz, passengers go through an airport inspection point to ensure that no foreign plants or animals are being introduced to the archipelago. Additionally, this inspection point is where we pay for the entrance to Galapagos National Park.

Our local guides will pick us up and take our luggage to the bus that transports passengers to the ferries for crossing the Itabaca Channel. After this, we'll be taken by another bus for a visit to Ranch Manzanillo where we suggest visitors wear comfortable walking shoes, light clothing, a waterproof jacket, sunblock, and bring their cameras and insect repellent for this first activity. The visit to Ranch Manzanillo includes a picnic lunch and a short walk before boarding our motor catamaran. It's important to have the above items with you, since passengers' luggage will be sent directly from the flights to the **M/C Seaman Journey** (our yacht).

Santa Cruz offers excellent opportunities to observe the wild Galapagos Tortoises. Tracking tortoises is not the only exciting activity to be found in the highlands. There are plenty of lava tubes, sinkholes, and craters ready to be explored. After this visit, we'll move to the yacht.

Day Three (Saturday, April 25)

AM: MORENO POINT, ISABELA ISLAND.

Punta Moreno is located on the north coast of Isabela Island, between the Sierra Negra and Cerro Azul volcanos. The trail runs along a Pahoeheo lava flow (solidified lava in a corrugated or accordion form) into a complex of coastal lagoons. Several species of birds can be found around these lakes and mangrove forests.

PM: FERNANDINA ISLAND, MANGLE POINT.

Off the eastern coast of Fernandina is Mangle Point. It's a superior snorkeling site and a beautiful location for riding in a panga or zodiac through the mangrove trees. A hike of about half a mile is possible. While you're on your boat ride, you'll likely to find sea lions, tortoises, pelicans, rays, and too many birds to name!



Day Four (Sunday, April 26)

AM: URBINA BAY AND DARWIN'S FINCHES

Urbina Bay is located at the base of Alcedo Volcano on the west coast, between Tagus Cove and Elizabeth Bay. This area experienced a major uplift in 1954, which caused the land to rise over 16 feet. The coast expanded half a mile out, leaving marine life stranded on the new shore. This area is also a great place to snorkel. Urbina Bay offers a hiking path that starts with a wet landing. The trail is approximately two miles long and is made up of sand, pumice, lava, coral, and vegetation, and is a fine place where one can observe iguana burrows and red and blue lobsters!

In Urbina Bay, you can find Darwin's famous finches. Its main attraction are the land iguanas, which are larger than those found on other islands. Additionally, we may see tortoises roaming about. A large number of interesting plants can be observed such as chamomile and rosewood, but among all these, the beautiful flowers of Darwin's Cotton, endemic to the Galapagos Islands, stands out.



PM: ISABELA ISLAND, TAGUS COVE

Tagus Cove is located west of Darwin Volcano on Isabela Island. This was a favored spot for pirates and whalers who started a tradition of inscribing the names of their boats on a cave wall. At the beginning of the trail, you'll find the small cave where inscriptions date back to the 1800s. The cove's name originated from a British warship that passed through the islands in 1814 looking for Galapagos Tortoises as food. Due to former eruptions, the substrate has a large amount of volcanic rock of different sizes, among the most common being little balls in a nearly spherical shape known as "lapilli" or "petrified rain."



Day Five (Monday, April 27)

AM: FERNANDINA ISLAND, ESPINOZA POINT.

Espinoza Point is a renowned location recognized for its extensive colonies of marine iguanas and as the habitat of unique species such as the Flightless Cormorant, Galapagos Penguin, Galapagos Hawk, and Galapagos Snake.


PM: VICENTE ROCA POINT.

One of the most impressive and spectacular places in the enchanted Galapagos Islands is Punta Vicente Roca, with its high cliffs and tuff, ash, and lava formations giving this area a majestic atmosphere. This large bay boasts spectacular marine life. Here, you can find seahorses, sea turtles, and the strange yet fascinating Mola-mola or Ocean Sunfish. This bay is a great place for enjoying panga rides and snorkeling. Also, you can find penguins, Blue-footed Boobies, terns, and sea lions. Take time to go for a snorkel for views of sea turtles, stingrays, and pufferfish.

Day Six (Tuesday, April 28)

AM: SANTIAGO ISLAND, ESPUMILLA BEACH

Espumilla Beach is located on the northern coast of Santiago Island in James Bay. During the last occurrence of the El Niño phenomenon, one of the two lagoons at this site underwent a process of sedimentation, thus causing the dis-



appearance of its representative colony of flamingos. The main attractions now are the Palo Santo forest and the nesting of turtles.

PM: PUERTO EGAS, SANTIAGO ISLAND

The black-sand beach located on the west side of the island is the main attraction. Its volcanic tuff deposits have favored the formation of this special beach. Egas Port is named in honor of Jorge Egas, an entrepreneur who explored the island in the 1930s and opened a salt mine at the foothill of Sugar-loaf Volcano. The site was visited in 1835 by the HMS *Beagle* and Charles Darwin, who described in his journals a group of Spaniards salting tortoise meat with the salt extracted from the area.

Day Seven (Wednesday, April 29)

RABIDA ISLAND

Rábida Island is unique due to the red color of the rock and sand. The volcanic material on this island is very porous where external factors such as rain, salt water, and sea breezes have acted as oxidizing agents. A short walk along a trail behind the beach leads to a coastal lagoon, which allows you to observe land birds such as finches, doves, Yellow Warblers, and mockingbirds. At the lagoon, there is a colony of flamingos.

PM: CHINESE HAT – SOMBRERO CHINO

This is a small islet located just off the southeastern tip of Santiago Island. It's a recent volcanic cone, shaped like a Chinese hat when seen from the north. On the west you can see lava formations, formed under the sea and raised upwards, resulting in the coral heads being found on top of the lava. This is an excellent location to see geological features such as lava tubes and lava flows. The landscape is occupied by a sea lion colony, marine iguanas, and Galapagos Penguins.

Day Eight (Thursday, April 30)

AM: BLACK TURTLE COVE, SANTA CRUZ ISLAND

A Zodiac ride to Black Turtle Cove, located on the north coast of Santa Cruz, just west of Baltra, offers a window into this wonderfully quiet hideaway of the Galapagos.

Once in the cove, the boat continues with the engines off and begins to explore the mangrove-protected landscape. Sea turtles feed and mate in the calm waters, and three species of sharks are found here: Blacktip Reef Shark, Whitetip Reef Shark, and Galapagos Shark. Groups of Spotted Rays are often seen, as well as egrets and herons.


After the visit, you'll be transferred to the Baltra Airport in time for your flight back to the mainland.






Deck Plans

Five Night Mainland Extension

May 1 – 6, 2026 – 5 Nights/6 Days

MAY 1 – 9:00 am pick up at Wyndham Quito Airport Hotel. Transfer (usually a 2.5 hour drive) to San Jorge de Tandayapa Hummingbird Sanctuary located in cloud forest, stopping at the Middle of the World Monument on the Equator. Check into your rooms at the lodge and then enjoy a traditional Andean luncheon on their observation deck, with spectacular views of hummingbird and toucan feeders, birds in the canopy, and the surrounding mountains. Dine with the Hummingbirds!

After lunch, join a bird walk in the lodge area, featuring 28 possible species of hummingbird amongst the 450 bird species, exotic flora and fauna, including many wild orchids in their natural habitat.

Overnight: San Jorge Tandayapa Lodge – queen & twin bed. Includes lunch & dinner.

MAY 2 – Tandayapa Hummingbird Sanctuary. At 6:00 am, visit the moth feeder and bird blind for rare birds and photo opportunities. Enjoy the Canopy Islands Observation Decks, ponds, and streams. Multi-colored bird species like the Blue-winged Mountain Tanager, Red-headed Barbet, Three-striped Warbler, White-winged Becard, Metallic-green Tanager, are just a few of what one can expect. Additionally, abounding hummingbird species visit the feeders, including the iconic Booted Racket-tail and the Violet-tailed Sylph. One can expect seasonal visits by the iconic Toucan Barbet, Plate-billed Mountain Toucan, Crested Quetzal, and the Golden-headed Quetzal.

Overnight: San Jorge Tandayapa Lodge. Includes three meals.

MAY 3 – Spend your early morning on the lodge's observation decks. After breakfast, at 9:00 am, transfer to San Jorge Milpe Reserve, located in the upper tropical rainforest. This area offers observation decks; a spacious 45-foot high covered tower overlooking the canopy; hummingbird, tanager, and toucan feeders; and trail walking. Possibilities include over 500 bird species such as the endemic Choco Toucan, Esmeraldas Antbird, Choco Warbler, Streaked Xenops, trogons, woodpeckers, tinamous, cuckoos, and more.

Overnight: San Jorge Milpe Forest Lodge – Rooms with 2 queen beds, includes three meals.

MAY 4 - Early morning observation decks. After breakfast, take a guided nature walk to the waterfalls including a picnic lunch. If you like, you may swim at the waterfalls. Return to the lodge with the remainder of the afternoon at leisure.

After dinner, enjoy a one-hour Night Walk looking for possible snakes, frogs, exotic insects, Common Potoo, Crested Owl, Spectacled Owl, Tropical-screech Owl, Rufescent-screech Owl, Cloud-forest Pygmy Owl, Choco Warbler, Oilbirds and Kinkajous.

Overnight: San Jorge Milpe Forest Lodge includes three meals.

MAY 5 – Morning birding at the Rio Tatal trails or Milpe Road, Forest Lodge observatory & tower. After lunch, at 2:00 pm, transfer to Wyndham Quito Airport Hotel (usually a 3 – 3-1/2 hour drive). Includes breakfast & lunch.

MAY 6 - Flights home.

Cost: \$2,598.00 per person, double occupancy – all-inclusive, based on a minimum of six participants. Single Supplement: \$240.00.
